Nearly ONE THOUSAND juveniles are on probation in Hennepin County. Over 70% of those young people are Black. Rebound, Inc. ("Rebound") is a grass roots, community-based non-profit dedicated to combatting the overrepresentation of African American youth in the juvenile justice system by leading the way in the innovation and provision of holistic, community centered, education, advocacy, and rehabilitation solutions at every phase of justice system involvement. Our initial programmatic efforts focus on reentry after correctional placement.

ONE HUNDRED PERCENT of the young people who are incarcerated will return to our community someday. Even under the best circumstances, when correctional programs have endowed them with new skills and a plan to use them, they return to impoverished households, under resourced schools and negative peer groups. Rebound's "Jordan house" seeks to step into the gap and build a bridge to success for young men by providing a residential group home setting where they can receive culturally-specific individual and family therapy, and life skills services designed to help them develop positive connections to their families and communities.

During the 2015-2016 fiscal year, we were overwhelmed by an outpouring of support for Rebound, Inc. and Jordan House. It is because of partnerships with community members and youth-serving organizations that we were able to provide a transformative experience to the young men in our care, and to end the year in a strong financial position.

Beginning in January 2018, Rebound, Inc. will build on the success of Jordan House by expanding services to young women. through Naima House. As we undertake this much needed work, we thank all of our donors and partners for their continued support.



100% Black/African/African American





Pcame to Jordan House in the middle of his senior year. He had been living with his 19 year old sister and her boyfriend and was being asked to leave. With a son of his own, JP was determined to graduate from high school and go on to college even though he was behind in his credits. Jordan House welcomed JP with open arms.


The case manager worked with JP and the staff at his school to develop and carry out a plan to recover the credits that he needed to graduate on time. In partnership with Transitions Plus, Jordan House was able to send JP off to Minneapolis Community and Technical College in the fall.

Before sending him off, Jordan House partnered with community members to make JP's senior year unforgettable. From prom to his open house, community members gave freely of their talents and resources to ensure that JP knew he had a village of support surrounding him.


And, as a final step in preparing JP for life on his own, Jordan House supported him in applying for independent living programs close to his sister.

Community Collaborations

Rebound, Inc. maintains a number of community collaborations designed to advance our mission. Through work with Empower Therapeutic Services we provide onsite therapy services tailored to meet the social and cultural needs the young people we serve. Through a collaboration with the YMCA, participates completed an 8 day canoe trip in the boundary waters and participated in both Youth in Government's Model Assembly and Model United Nations programs. Through a collaboration with Bolder Options, the youth trained for a triathlon. Through collaborations with Juxtaposition Arts & Minneapolis Park and Recreation, our young men participated in a graffiti arts program and 10 week music production camp. Youth also completed a week-long job shadow experience with a museum exhibit designer and radio personality in addition to volunteering through House of Charity, Habitat for Humanity and Neighborhoods Organizing for Change.
